Minister's Letter

Dear friends,

Where shall we go from here?

Summer holidays are drawing close to an end. Schools and some colleges have returned; soon it will be the turn of universities. Many will ask as to where all the time has gone. Yet, as new terms have started and new ones soon commence, it is also time to ask, 'where do we go from here?'

Where shall we go? What activities shall we undertake? What resources do we need and have available? What will be our priorities? In an everchanging world where former certainties are no longer those may be difficult questions to answer. As the people of God, though, we are tasked with answering them for each generation and place. Where we shall go will be answered by our view and vision for mission and ministry. In some ways, as minister, it could be easier to sit back and attend only to the spiritual and pastoral needs of the congregation. But that would fulfil neither my call nor that of this congregation. So, what shall we do?

As a congregation, we need to share with each other both our hopes and fears for ourselves and the wider Christian faith. We need to reflect prayerfully on where, and how, God may be speaking to us. We need to consider His calling upon our individual lives and respond to that. Together we will discern where, and to what, God is calling us. There will be time and opportunity made to do this.

In spite of the challenges we have hope. Ultimately, we are headed toward Christ.

St. John's Buildings

On Tuesday August 12th the long and difficult process of disposing of St. John's Church was completed. While we may be relieved that we are no longer responsible for the upkeep of the buildings, it also presents to us a time of sorrow and grief. These are responses that are both natural and right.

Church buildings are more than the structures we attend for worship on a Sunday. They are places where memories are formed, where relationships are built. They are places where generations of families came to be. Church buildings are places where love may be found, marriages blessed, and children baptised. They are places where we may say a final farewell to a loved one too. Our buildings are places that support community and offer sanctuary. In other words, place of worship, church buildings, are formative building blocks of community. They offer a sense of place. It is these important issues that underpin our grief when these places are lost to us.

We must bear this in mind when we talk about it.

Who, what, and how much?

Although intimated to the Sunday congregation, our minister and elders believe that the full details of the sale should be made available.

Who was involved?

The legal documents enabling the sale and transfer of the manse and church were signed by representatives of both the congregation and the Presbytery. Those signing were holders of defined offices within the church. The deeds determined that the minister and elders signed on behalf of the congregation, alongside the Moderator and Clerk to Presbytery. The Kirk Session nominated three representatives to sign on their behalf.

Those signing on behalf of the congregation were Rev. Alex McAspurren, Crawford Morgan, Anne Noble and John Armstrong. Representing the Presbytery were Rev. Dr Alexander Forsyth, Moderator, and Dr Hazel Hastie, Clerk.

What next?

In due course 15% of the purchase price will be deducted by the Church of Scotland for wider church property purposes, along with a deduction for conveyancing. The balance of the funds will then be transferred to Bathgate Parish Church.

Should you have any questions in respect of the above then please feel free to ask Alex or Crawford, and they will endeavour to answer.

For now, though, let us remember our grieving brothers and sisters of St. John's church, wherever they may be. Let us uphold them in prayer. Let us also give thanks for the good memories and blessings experienced by that congregation across its history. Let us not forget but let us also together forge a new history together as we seek to serve Christ and the Kingdom in the years to come.



Finance and Property Report

The St John's Church and hall, and the manse and Tryst Hall, were advertised for sale as one or two lots. The St. John's church was valued at £265,000 (and sold for £260,500) and the manse and Tryst Hall was valued at £430,000 (and sold for £430,000). There was significant interest in the buildings and many viewings and they were sold on 12 August 2025. The details of the sale are contained in a separate article elsewhere in this newsletter.

At present our regular donations do not cover our day-to-day spending, which is not sustainable in the long-term. A donation analysis was carried out in July 2025. The number and value of donations per member of the congregation in each giving band is as follows (excludes gift aid - the HMRC refund in 2024/25 was £14,273):



Finance and Property Report Continued

Although there has been a significant addition to the church funds following the sale of the St John's buildings, these funds can only be used for major fabric works.

Maintenance and repair work is required for the church and large hall roofs and gutters. Donald Forbes, Edinburgh and West Lothian Presbytery Buildings Officer, provided an opinion on the works required following a drone survey. Invitations have been issued to three contractors to provide quotations for the specified works. The quotations will be examined shortly, with input from the Presbytery Buildings Officer. It is expected that the works will be carried out in the autumn. Please follow any signage providing instructions for your safety while the work is being carried out.

If you are a taxpayer and eligible to claim gift aid, then HMRC will boost your offerings by 25p for every £1 you donate. Gift Aid Declaration forms are available in the church vestibule. Completed forms can be returned to the church office or left in a sealed envelope in the offering plate on a Sunday morning.

Additional volunteers are needed to help with the weekly count after the Sunday service and especially in the church office (which is currently open Monday to Friday from 10.00 AM to 12.00 noon). If you can help, or would like more information, then please speak with Ian McLean. If there are an insufficient number of volunteers, then this could lead to the office having to be closed on some days.


The Flower Committee

The group met at St. Columba's Episcopal Church on Tuesday 5th August.

We had a report on the funeral of Keith Stirling, (our representative from Torphichen Kirk, who had sadly passed away). We gave thanks for all Keith did to help and promote BCT.

Kathleen Grant [EU, URC], has stepped down from the group and we gave thanks for her commitment and help over the years.

After a time of devotion and approving the minutes, we went on to business matters.

- [1] **The Carmelite Monastery**. Margaret Hardy and Rev. Rosie Addis had a very enjoyable visit to the new Carmelite Monastery at Balmuir Road. All six nuns were there and had been given a special dispensation to talk. Most of their time is spent in prayer and meditation, and it may be possible to arrange meditation sessions with them. They also have some business activities including pottery and printing. They are still settling in and adapting to the building which is very large.
- [2] Christian Aid coffee morning in St. Mary's on 13th September from 10-12. We discussed the arrangements for setting up the day before, the various tasks to be covered on the day itself and the clearing up. There will be tables for a bottle tombola, jewellery and children's books. Gifts of baking will be much appreciated and if anyone would like to donate towards the Tombola, that would be very acceptable. (bottles worth £2) Any donations can be handed in to the church hall (St. Mary's) on Friday 12th between 2-4pm or on the Saturday morning. - [3]. **Our Treasurers Account** will be closed on 13th Nov. 2025, and our account will be changed to a Community Account. We will need to get into internet banking, and our treasurer has begun this process. Current balance in account is £640.29
- [4] Repair of the 1624 Latin Bible on display in the Partnership Centre. A quote of £700 has been given by RDW in Falkirk for this urgent repair needed. Donations have been offered from BCT, Harry Cartmill and a grant from the Councilors' Disbursement Fund, with the hope of other support. To receive any Grants, BCT need to draw up a constitution and this is in hand.
- [5] Planter in the precinct, maintained by BCT, is looking good.
- [6] **Fairtrade Fortnight 22nd Sep. 5th Oct.** West Lothian Council asked whether BCT were participating in Fairtrade. Bathgate Parish Church Guild are having speakers from Linlithgow Fairtrade Partnership coming to our meeting on Wed. 17th Sept. This will be in the large hall, and an invitation will be extended to all the churches. There will be a stall with Fairtrade goods for sale.
- [7] **The Asylum seekers in the Cairn Hotel.** Hopefully we will receive an updated report on the development of the Cairn Hotel community inclusion group (CHCIG) at our next meeting.
- [8] **The Chosen**. The Chosen is described as a groundbreaking historical drama based on the life of Jesus Christ (Jonathan Roumie), seen through the eyes of those who knew him. St. Columba's and Boghall parish churches are arranging a joint programme beginning on Monday 1st September with discussion on the 1st and 3rd Monday in Boghall Parish Church and screening on the 2nd and 4th Monday in St. Columba's Episcopal Church. **Continued...**

If you go for a walk in the countryside on a warm summer's day you might find a little grasshopper in amongst some grasses.

Probably you would hear it before you saw it. It is very tiny



and well camouflaged in the grass as it is almost all green or brown. The male grasshoppers are said to 'sing' for their mates but they are actually rubbing their back legs against their

wings to try to attract a mate. There are 10,000 different types of grasshopper in the world, with 24 different types living in Britain. Athough famous for their 'singing', they are even more famous for their jumping!

A grasshopper in Britain probably measures about 2 or 3 centimetres but it can jump up to about 70 centimetres - not at all bad for a little insect! Maybe there should be an 'Insect Olympics'. I think they could teach us a thing or two!

If you are lucky enough to see one there is no need to feel scared as they only eat plants and won't hurt you.
