#### **Fabric matters**

There are — as always — things on the go with the High Church buildings. Looking after buildings is a frustrating business, but Jean has kept things moving on all fronts in her usual tireless fashion.

The biggest questions at the moment are around the condition of the sanctuary. There are issues that we know about and have plans and costings for, but because we have been in vacancy and interim ministry for so long over the last few years, Presbytery has not allowed us to carry these out. It has now reached the stage that things like the stonework are deteriorating, and the Board and Session, as trustees of a listed building are starting to push for some of these programmes of work to start moving.

As you will be aware, a small, ornamental piece of plaster fell from the ceiling at Easter time. This has prompted a whole progression of checks to make sure that the building is safe. This is now being coordinated by an architect who specialises in the preservation and development of listed buildings.

Firstly, a roof inspection was carried out. This identified a programme of work which is maintenance work rather than repair, and though, at present, the roof is watertight, there are some issues which have been identified as an immediate concern to keep it in that condition.

Checks on the plasterwork by a plaster consultant and a structural engineer suggested that there was no indication of water ingress and that any visible cracking was due to historical movement, so did not seem to be of immediate concern. Indications are that some concerns about the condition of the plaster can be explained by previous work carried out on the building. We are awaiting a final report from the structural engineer and there is one final plaster check to have confirmed and if these come back as clear, we are likely to be in a position to move back into the sanctuary. This may take a week or two after we get the 'all clear' as cleaning will need to take place and we will have to check seating arrangements due to changes in social distancing advice.

With the return to the sanctuary, we hope that this step towards normality will encourage worshippers to return in greater numbers in the knowledge that we have their safety as an utmost priority, both in terms of the building and also our Covid arrangements.

#### Church life

As restrictions continue to ease, church life is slowly returning to its 'new normal'.

In worship, we continue to use the Hall, but will look to return to the sanctuary as soon as we are given the all clear to do so. Currently the Hall is set out with a 2m distancing zine and a 1m distancing zone so that people are able to sit wherever they are most comfortable. Following our successful Communion last month, we will be celebrating Communion again later in September, with the service likely to be taken by our new interim Moderator, Rev. Nelu Balaj from Livingston Old Church.

Organisations are starting to look at how they can restart safely. The Sunday School will restart from the second Sunday in September and this week also sees the resumption of the Pre-school midweek provision. Further details regarding Pre-school are available on their Facebook page, from the church Facebook page. The Friday Club will not be restarting in the immediate future as current Covid restrictions would impact on the kinds of activities they do. The BBs are aiming to contact parents within the coming week to look at potential numbers. Other organisations are also looking at Covid guidelines to see how and when they can restart safely. The most up to date information will be available on the church website and Facebook page.

Many of you will have visited the highly successful Thrift Shop over the past week. We used this as a 'trial run' to see how successful our new guidelines for hospitality were. These seemed to work very effectively, giving a lead to other organisations and also opening up the restarting of the church Coffee Mornings which have been a vital link in establishing a sense of fellowship

and inviting other congregations and the community to meet us in an informal setting.

It should be noted, though, that with organisations restarting, members are asked to consider if they could come forward to help in any way. The Preschool, BB's and Coffee Morning teams would be glad to hear from anyone who could help in any way. Similarly, Jean would value any help folks could give on cleaning and setting up for the organisations. Please consider if you could make any of these opportunities part of your service to the church. Nor should you feel restricted to these examples whatever you wish to offer — Art work, Welcome Team, contributing to worship, Choir, Music Group — don't feel that you need to wait to be asked!

#### **Vacancy matters**

Again, the report reflects what is very much a work in progress. There are time constraints, as Presbytery would like to have the allocation of ministry posts – and therefore charges – agreed by December 2021. This is the first stage of reorganisation. The second stage will involve looking at the future of buildings and this will be overseen by the new joint West Lothian and Edinburgh Presbyteries.

What is clear, from the Church of Scotland Assembly decisions and the plan following on from this from Presbytery, is that everyone is going to be affected to some extent. With Bathgate and St John's both vacant, it is clear that these churches in particular are the focus for attention.

There are a number of scenarios, and these are, at present, speculation. Presbytery is unlikely to support a linkage of churches as this does nothing to diminish the upkeep costs of large, old buildings, but spreads ministry more thinly. The most likely scenario therefore involves a union of St John's and the High. How far this extends is also speculative — there seem to be two ministry posts allocated to Bathgate and Boghall, but Boghall already has a minister in place. If Boghall were to become formally involved with the town

centre churches, this opens up the possibility of a team ministry model, with one minister and one other post based around family outreach, youth work or IT based ministry. If Boghall remains as is, it is hard to see how anything but one ministry post for a united St John's and High would be the only realistic option.

Looking at such a union is sure to stir up huge emotions, but it is important to be clear about what a union means. Both the High Church and St John's would no longer exist as Church of Scotland charges. There would, instead, be one totally new charge — Bathgate Church of Scotland (or whatever the new congregation decides). This new charge would have a single congregation, a single Board and a single Session. If the two congregations chose to unite, all members of both churches would become members of the new, united congregation unless they chose to worship elsewhere. The new charge would, importantly, be able to choose and call a minister.

While many will feel uncomfortable at the idea of a union it is important to stress that this cannot come about unless the congregation votes for it.

Despite the misgivings some may feel, a union offers many advantages. The increased numbers in the congregation and the increase in giving would give a strong sense of collective Fellowship and the capacity to fill and develop all the posts and areas of responsibility within a charge. Increased giving may be able to fund new initiatives or development posts. The increased congregation is also likely to increase the capacity and stability of the organisations which would now be part of the united charge.

The buildings issue is possibly the most emotive aspect of a union, as memories and family history mean a strong sense of ownership. The decision whether or not to unite would be taken before any decision on where the worship centre in Bathgate town would be. There is a very real sense in which we have to be prepared to worship wherever God is rather than only in 'our' building. The Church of Scotland three years ago produced a report titled 'Well equipped spaces, in the right places' where it looked at what 'church' might look at in the future — an on-line presence, flexibility, adaptability and the ability to be used more than once a week and

commercially viable. Held against this document, it is clear that no churches in Bathgate fit the pattern of what a modern place of worship requires. Whichever church were to be chosen, extensive refurbishment would be needed to approach what the Church of Scotland sees as a 'Well equipped space'. The sale of unused buildings would hopefully be able to go a long way in funding this redevelopment. Some churches have even taken the decision to look at repurposed modern buildings as an alternative to a traditional church building.

it seems to me that now is the time to examine our feelings — heart and mind — as to what we see 'church' as being. Whatever step we take next it is a first step, and there is long journey to go. We do need to examine, though, why we feel the way we do to help us decide what we need to fight for and what is not a priority. We will be looking at ways to collect and collate peoples' views in the near future as whole church meetings are probably still not advisable.

I would therefore encourage folks to examine their feelings, motivations and the reasons behind them so that views can be expressed effectively and discussed fully. Think of what you feel church needs to be, as the current model is resulting in dwindling and ageing congregations with fewer and fewer people taking on more and more tasks just to keep things working. We need to build vision for the future, or our memories may ultimately get in the way of us being able to create new memories.

We will be meeting on Tuesdays from 1.00 pm until 2.15 pm and on Thursdays from 10.00 am until 11.15 am and we look forward to welcoming any pre-school children.

#### Finance Report

Dear Friends, As you can imagine, the finances of the Church have been hard hit over the last 18 months or so.

Luckily the donations are largely at the same level as last year , however , due to the manse not being rented for a couple of months at the start of the year and a slight decrease in Fabric Fund income , our income is down £ 4,000 . Our outgoings are down about £ 900 compared to last year .

Thankfully the Church has been able to take advantage of the Job Retention Scheme and this has ensured that the deficit has been at about £ 2,500 compared to £ 6,800 had this Scheme not been in place .

However this ends at the end of next month.

Please pray for the finances of the Church, and hopefully as we exit lockdown our income can increase.
