

## Vacancy matters

Following a Presbytery meeting and the Session meetings in November, it appears that Presbytery is supportive of the suggestion of the High and St John's uniting, though the Presbytery Mission Plan, outlining the distribution of ministry posts and charges in West Lothian has still to be passed formally. The timescale for this is complicated by West Lothian and Edinburgh Presbyteries merging in January, and all ministry vacancies are currently 'on hold'. If congregational votes support union, we could be in a position to call a minister as a united congregation by late summer or early autumn.

## **Finance Report October 2021**

Total donations are down £2,400 from this time last year. However total income is up by over £600 compared to this time last year.

Total payments are down by just under £2,000 over the same period last year. Without the furlough scheme we would be on an overall deficit of £1,848, however with this payment we have a surplus of £3,667. The Furlough Scheme has now finished.

Bathgate High's Mission & Ministry contribution was set at £59,896, higher than our current contribution which is £51,925. This figure is likely to be discounted by around £12,000 since we are in vacancy, bringing it down to around £40,000

Presbytery dues are up substantially, from £770 to £1,722.
