Dear Friends,

We are a month away from All Saints Day, and I wonder – "What is a Saint?" Answer – you are! Saint Paul wrote letters to the Churches – and he greeted them in the same way – "To the Saints at Phillipi" or wherever. If he was writing a letter to us, he would have addressed it to "The Saints who are in St John's Bathgate". If you follow Jesus, as I know you do, you are a Saint. The trouble is, nowadays the term "Saint" is confined to outstandingly devout people, like Mother Teresa, or people like the Apostles, of whom our Saint John was one. We tend to think they are more or less perfect, and put them on a pedestal, but that is to deny their common humanity, warts and all. I read somewhere that some of the Nuns who worked for Mother Teresa said she could be really tough on them sometimes, and even the great Saint Paul was prone to argue and boast (he said so himself!). He could be hard on young followers, as he was to poor homesick Mark, and he fell out with the gentle Barnabas over his refusal to give the lad a second chance. And his views on women speaking in Church were a throwback to the Pharisee he once was.

But does that make him any less a Saint? Of course not – he was probably the greatest and most intelligent and bravest Christian who ever lived. It just means he was a sinful human being, not perfect like Christ, in fact with faults just like you and me. So there is hope for us – despite our faults and failings, we too can be Saints – in fact we are!

I'm reading a book given me by Sarah Young at Torphichen, all about the early Saints of Ireland and Scotland. It's called "Islands of the Evening", by Alistair Moffat, and it tells us of the extreme lengths some of them went to mortify the flesh and thus become holier and, as they thought, nearer God. They built their tiny cells on remote windswept Islands, they ate just enough to keep them alive, and they prayed for hours standing up to their necks in a cold Loch.

Now you don't have to do any of that to prove that you are a Saint – God is quite happy to call you a "Saint" just as you are, but of course always striving to be a better Christian.

You have all had the patience of Saints as you waited for some clarity about the future of our beloved Church of Saint John. Now we have it. Union is coming, and we shall lose that wonderful name – "Saint John's", and exchange it for the prosaic "Bathgate Parish Church". The Saints at the High will also lose their special name. And we will become the Saints United! Let us pray that this coming Union will be a blessing to all the Saints in the two Churches, and to the people of Bathgate.

Closure of St John's

The Union of St John's Church and the High Church having been agreed by both congregations and the Presbytery of Edinburgh and West Lothian, there remained the question of which set of buildings would be used to accommodate the new Bathgate Parish Church. The decision on which buildings would serve would be made by Presbytery and there would be no appealing of its decision.

At its meeting on Tuesday 5 December 2023, Presbytery will consider the proposal of its Deployment Committee that 'the complex at Bathgate High be retained for mission and the complex at Bathgate St John's be released'. In other words, St John's buildings will be closed. There is no reason to suppose Presbytery will reject this proposal.

Data on the people and property of the two congregations had been gathered by the Deployment Committee and from this information it judged that the High Church had a younger congregation and so would have a better base for mission with the younger elements in the community and it had a 'a larger leadership core on which to build'; also, its finances had been stronger over the years. The Committee acknowledged that St John's buildings were in a better condition than the High's and it suggested that St John's would be more easily sold and money from its sale 'could address fabric issues', presumably at the High Church complex.

Optimistically, the Committee thought 'the retention of the Bathgate High complex may be best when looking at the longer term presence of a Church of Scotland congregation in Bathgate'; pessimistically, it thought that if circumstances reached 'a point when even the Bathgate High sanctuary cannot be sustained', 'the separate hall at Bathgate High could be used as the locus for the Church of Scotland in Bathgate'.

The Committee said 'Mission' had been the factor that had led it to its decision which was offered 'with recognition that both congregations have engaged in excellent mission and there will be great sadness and a sense of loss in Bathgate St John's'.

Dear Friends of St. John's

Christmas is rapidly approaching, and my choir is diligently practising for a Christmas party for older people in our community. Our repertoire includes 'Silent Night' and 'Joy to the World' alongside some festive non-religious tunes such as 'Santa Claus Is Coming to Town' and 'Rudolph the Red-Nosed Reindeer'.

What Christmas song holds a special place in your heart? As I shared in last December's newsletter, my favourite is 'The Twelve Days of Christmas'. While not widely known in Japan, the melody of this song starts playing on a loop in my mind as Christmas draws near, filling me with the festive spirit.

Recently, I realised that if your true love gave you all the gifts mentioned in the lyrics, the number of gifts given each day would follow an interesting mathematical pattern.

Day 1: 1 partridge = 1 gift

Day 2: 1 partridge + 2 doves = 3 gifts


Day 3: 1 partridge + 2 doves + 3 hens = 6 gifts

Day 4: 1 partridge + 2 doves + 3 hens + 4 calling birds = 10 gifts









Thus, the number of gifts for each day is 1, 3, 6, 10, 15, 21, and so on. This sequence is known as the triangular numbers, which I learnt in my senior school maths class. The \mathbf{n}^{th} triangular number is given by the formula $\mathbf{n}(\mathbf{n+1})/2$. For example, to find out how many gifts you would receive on the fourth day, substitute $\mathbf{n} = 4$ into this formula, and you will find that 4(4+1)/2 = 10 gifts, and similarly 78 gifts on the twelfth day.

Furthermore, the sum of the first n triangular numbers is given by n(n+1)(n+2)/6. Using this formula, we see that in 12 days, you will receive a total of 364 gifts! Your true love is certainly generous, but what would you do with so many birds and people? I would rather just get the gold rings.
